# unDisclosed: 2nd National Indigenous Art Triennial

unDisclosed: 2nd National Indigenous Art Triennial, a travelling exhibition from the National Gallery of Australia, commences its national tour at the University of South Australia's Anne & Gordon Samstag Museum of Art from 3 May 2013. unDisclosed features the work of twenty Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists from regional, remote and urban communities providing an overview of the diversity and richness of contemporary Indigenous art practice in Australia today.

The exhibition explores the spoken and unspoken, the known and the unknown, what can be revealed and what cannot. It celebrates the diversity of contemporary Indigenous art with painting on canvas and bark, sculpture, weaving, new media, photo-media, print-making and installation work.

unDisclosed curator Carly Lane, a Kalkadoon woman from North West Queensland with a background in curatorship, anthropology and art said, 'The artists have been selected for their commitment to excellence and their daring to explore new fields of practice and artistic vision, these artists both inform and redefine contemporary Indigenous art as we presently know it'.

The inaugural National Indigenous Art Triennial, *Culture Warriors*, curated by then National Gallery of Australia, Senior Curator of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Art, Brenda L Croft, gave formal recognition of Indigenous artists and their collective importance. Lane says the second Triennial carries forward and reminds audiences that Indigenous art is always contemporary and that Indigenous artists continue to provide a voice and visibility for Indigenous Australians.
