UniSA Alumni

Alumni Membership

The following outlines the membership criteria of UniSA alumni.

UniSA Alumni

An alumnus of the University of South Australia is defined as a graduate of the institution or any of its predecessor institutions, past or present Council member, or a staff member who has served the equivalent of five years full time.

A current student or staff member may participate in alumni activities, but is not a full registered member until the above criteria are met.

Chapter/Group membership

All students and others who meet these criteria are automatically considered members of the UniSA alumni network and will receive recognition and regular communication from the University. Additionally, alumni may join relevant chapters, groups and clubs who offer special events and services according to the role and interests of the entity.

Recognition

For the purposes of public recognition and acknowledgement, UniSA Alumni also uses two other descriptive classifications. These classifications are determined by the University, but may involve consultation with various chapters and individual alumni members.

- **Prominent Alumni**

A prominent alumnus, defined for the purposes of recognition and public acknowledgement, is distinguished by their excellence in their chosen field nationally or internationally. They will be outstanding leaders in the community and have made significant or extraordinary contribution to society over a period of time.

- **High Achiever Alumni**

A high achiever alumnus will have graduated from UniSA at least 10 years ago and have achieved distinction in their chosen business, profession or work life.

- **Young Achiever Alumni**

A young achiever alumnus will be under 30 years of age and have demonstrated great potential in their first few years after graduation. They will demonstrate outstanding professional achievement and continue to be an inspiration for the next generation of graduates and the community at large.
