Raspy Cricket

Also known as 'Clint' the Night Cricket or 'Clint' the Tree Cricket

- Description:**
- Length: 30mm-80mm
 - Medium sized to large cricket with small, soft abdomen and very long antenna (up to 150 mm)
 - Prominent dark eyes, high up on sides of head. Often with large mandibles
 - Three pairs of legs, hind-legs enlarged for jumping; legs strongly spined
 - Colour ranges from pale fawn to dark brown or even black
 - Males possess wings, folded over abdomen; females are often wingless
 - Large ovipositor on females may be straight or curled over abdomen, this is particularly so for nymphal stages
 - Incomplete metamorphoses. Nymphs: similar to adults, though smaller and wingless

Likely to be found in: A wide range of habitats, from forest to woodlands and grassland to urban environments. Then hides in soil cracks, tree hollows, hollow logs, or leaf-litter during day, emerging at night to feed. Found throughout eastern and central Australia. Present year round in Adelaide.

Last seen: Snooping around at night in well vegetated backyards, parks and local bushland.
