	✓		As there was no explicit method described as to how articles were located, it is difficult to assess if all appropriate papers/resources were assessed. The authors stated that "This review provides a general outline of medicolegal and ethical aspects of palliative dysphagia management to increase SLPs' awareness of a range of important issues." The lack of a described method considerably weakens the paper's level of evidence.

			"Speech-language Pathologists (SLPs) have a role in palliative dysphagia management, however, this can involve unique legal and ethical challenges. The legal position on provision and cessation of nutrition and hydration differs between Australian States and Territories. Decisions by the courts have established a body of relevant case law. This article introduces SLPs to some of the important considerations for legal and ethical palliative care, but is not intended to be directive. SLPs are encouraged to explore
			their local options for ethical and medico-legal guidance."
