2		✓		Reliability of information Is the author of the information identified? Yes: Deepika P. Kulkarni, Vandan D. Kamath, Jonathan T. Stewart  Does the author of the information have the qualifications or experience to write on this topic? While all three authors appear to have clinical backgrounds in either the area of stroke (Ms Kulkarni, Dr Stewart) or speech pathology (Dr Kamath), their research profile in the area is slim (consisting of only this literature review), and detailed information about their qualifications and experience is difficult to locate. It appears that Ms Kulkarni is a student – this may explain the previous lack of research publications in the area.  Does the information come from an 'authoritative source'? It is difficult to comment on whether or not the source of this information is 'authoritative' due to missing information regarding author qualifications and experience, in combination with the lack of search information provided for this review.
3	✓			Accuracy of information How is the information presented? Information is presented in both a logical format, which offers an overview of common problems and possible management solutions. The authors comment that more systematic reviews of information are not present in the literature.  If the information is presented as fact, can it be checked? The information presented in the paper is regularly and well sourced and cited. It would be easy to check when information is presented as fact if this fact is true.  Is the information biased? The authors make an effort to appear impartial in their delivery of the information, especially when considering the pathophysiology components of the paper.
