



Major donors support new South Australian landmark

Two major donations have boosted the development of the Bob Hawke Prime Ministerial Centre in the new Hawke Building.

The Packer family has made a personal donation of \$2 million in memory of the late Kerry Packer while Allan Scott of the Scott Group of Companies has secured the naming rights to the largest auditorium in the building.

Located on North Terrace the \$35 million Hawke Building is now nearing completion and will

present an avant-garde entree to UniSA when it opens later in the year. It will become a new cultural venue for the State incorporating a 400 seat auditorium to be known as the Allan Scott Auditorium and a Civic Gallery to be named in honour of Kerry Packer.

Vice Chancellor, Professor Denise Bradley said, "this enormously generous gift from the Packer family pays tribute to Bob Hawke's national leadership legacy. More importantly, it is an investment in new generations and we

are sincerely grateful to them for their vote of confidence in the Hawke Centre program and UniSA."

Chancellor, David Klingberg said about the support from Allan Scott, "We are absolutely delighted by this milestone sponsorship. Mr Scott's commitment to making education more accessible to the people is a defining characteristic of our University and of the new landmark building. More than any other university space, this building will be a focus of intellectual

engagement with the community."

The Civic Gallery will be open to the public and its exhibition focus will be on global citizenship, democratic leadership, and social and environmental action, including presentation of current University research projects that are bringing major benefits back to the community at large. The Gallery will also pay tribute to the Kurna people and their educational traditions.

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Maurice de Rohan's Legacy

The legacy of one of South Australia's greatest ambassadors, the late Maurice de Rohan, will continue through a new scholarship at UniSA, bearing his name.

Valued at \$15,000 plus UniSA Travel Grant, the Maurice de Rohan scholarship will provide the opportunity for higher degree research students to undertake a doctoral degree or to upgrade from a master's degree by research to a doctoral degree.

Maurice was committed to the development of a strong, mature relationship between South Australia and the United Kingdom. This scholarship reflects Maurice's passion and achievements and will enable others to carry on his legacy.

The scholarship will lend an international perspective to the student's thesis by providing the opportunity to undertake research or work with institutional or industry partners in the UK or USA.

UniSA Foundation Committee Annual Summary 2006

2006 was a significant year for the University's philanthropic activity. Over \$2.75m in donations was received and now more than \$6m in donated funds are under management by the Foundation Committee and \$2.5m was distributed in 2006.

Chair of committee reports on the year

I am very pleased to report on the first full year of operation for the UniSA Foundation Committee for 2006. The year has been the most successful fundraising period since the inception of the University in 1991. Two individual donations totaling over \$2.5m were received and \$288,000 was awarded in scholarships, grants and prizes to 77 recipients. The UniSA Foundation Committee now manages approximately \$6m, of which \$1m relates to 50 scholarship schemes.

A significant proportion of the University donations are under management and with the assistance of Fivepoint Financial Planning we have achieved a return for 2006 of 21.6%. The balanced investment strategy progressively being implemented includes 50% Australian shares, 15% international shares, 15% property, 10% interest bearing and 10% cash.

I would like to acknowledge our Investment Advisor, Dean Brice and Paul Ingram, Partner, Minter Ellison, for their ongoing advice and support of the UniSA Foundation Committee.

On behalf of the UniSA Foundation Committee, I would like to sincerely thank the many bequestors and donors, both corporate and individual, who have supported the University during 2006.

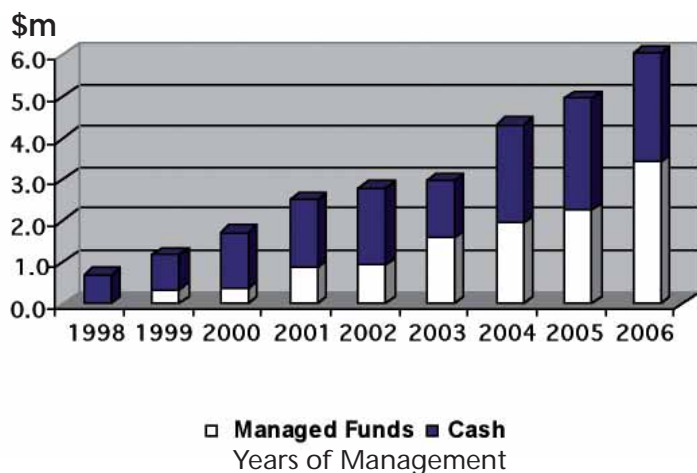

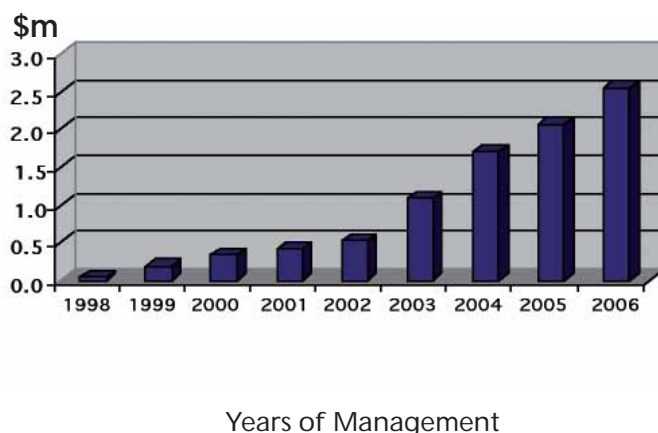
The role of the Foundation Committee is to assist council in exercising due care, diligence and skill in managing and administering philanthropic funds received from donors.

Total Funds under management by the UniSA Foundation Committee 1998 – 2006



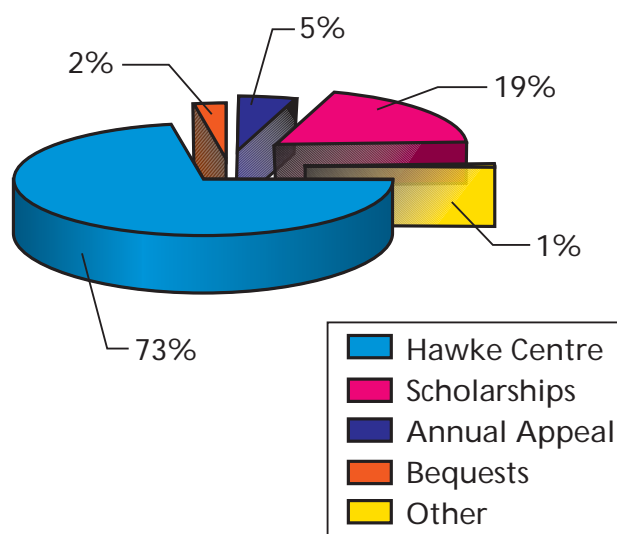
Total Payments made 1998 – 2006



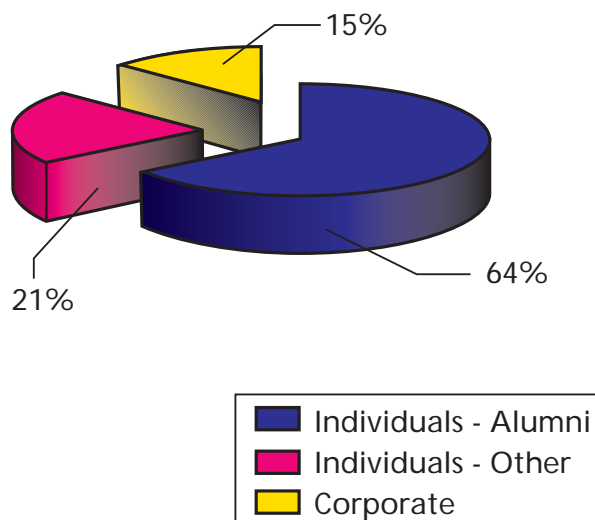

New Scholarships

Ahrens Scholarship

Valued at \$6,000 annually for a student in the Bachelor of Construction Management degree. Also an additional Scholarship Dux award of \$7,000 at the completion of the scholarship.

Bellberry Scholarship

Valued at \$25,000 per year for 3.5 years, for two PhD students to undertake research within the field of medical and health ethics.

Central Northern Adelaide Health Services Scholarship

Valued at \$29,000 per year for three years – for two post-graduate students to undertake research within the field of Health Systems Reform: Chronic Disease Management and Hospitalisation Avoidance.

Department of Transport, Energy & Infrastructure Scholarship in Civil Engineering

Valued at \$10,800 and includes 8 week paid employment during summer vacation periods for Bachelor of Engineering (Civil Engineering) or associated engineering degree.

ISS Facility Services International Experience Grant

Valued at \$15,000 for a second year business student undertaking an international exchange.

Pearce Family Transition Grants

Six grants for rural students in the Bachelor of Education program of \$1,500 and six grants of \$1,000 for financially disadvantaged metropolitan students to help with the transition to University.

Won in 2006 by James Gummow, the Constance Gordon-Johnson Sculpture Prize was established by Patricia Gordon-Stevens and Marcus Stevens in honour of their late sister and sister-in-law, to support talented student sculptor artists at UniSA.

His unique, in-perpetuity bequest, ranks as the greatest gift made expressly for the development and education of Australian

visual artists. Samstag Scholarships – presented through the South Australian School of Art – pay for all the costs of twelve months of overseas study, including provision of an unusually generous stipend, return airfares and institutional study fees.

At the luncheon, new members were presented with a framed Chancellor’s Club parchment and gold lapel pin by the Chancellor, Mr David Klingberg AM.

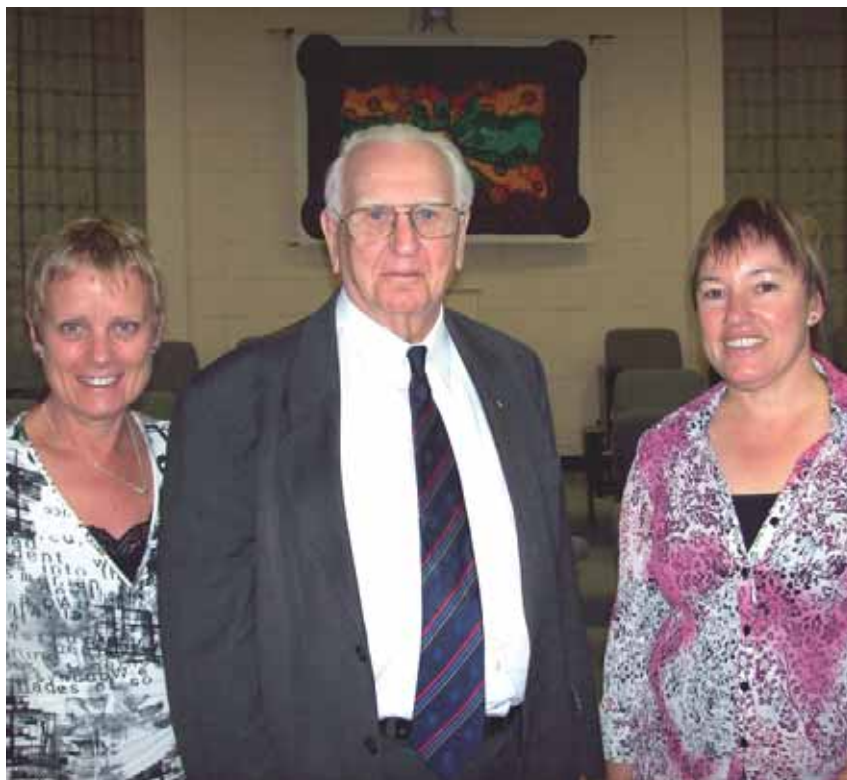

Four other seminars were held in the Adelaide metro area in 2006 and topics included, Retirement Living, Memory Loss and Changes in Ageing, Living with Diabetes, and The Internet Demystified. This last seminar was the most popular with well over 300 people attending.

Dr Norton Jackson AM, Chair of the UniSA Bequest Committee and MC for the seminars said that, "although there is a core following of attendees at these seminars, there are always new people too. Usually there is a clear 50/50 divide, which means that we are still reaching the right audience".

The William T Southcott Scholarship

Helping our Leaders of Tomorrow

In 2006, Nick Palousis, outstanding postgraduate research student, was offered the inaugural William T Southcott Scholarship. The \$105,000 Scholarship, established by a generous bequest

from engineer Mr William T Southcott, is now helping Nick undertake research leading to a PhD in the field of Advanced Manufacturing Engineering.

Whyalla-born, Nick is an aggressively ambitious businessman with a difference - the 25-year-old has a strong passion to save the planet. Combined with some country boy charm, it's not hard to see

why this serial high-achiever is emerging as one of Australia's most influential young science entrepreneurs.

Palousis, who already has a swag of engineering and leadership awards under his belt, including "Young South Australian of the Year 2006", said his biggest achievement to date has been co-founding the influential non-profit group, The Natural Edge Project, a sustainability think-tank of which Palousis is a secretariat member. When asked what winning the scholarship has meant to him Palousis said "the scholarship has provided me with the opportunity to make a significant contribution to the emerging field of risk management for sustainability in the automotive manufacturing industry.

It is giving me the best possible chance of success, by not only covering my time financially but also assisting me in making contact with a number of influential bodies and people in the field, such as the European Commission and Ford Werke AG".

He further commented that "the research is on track to delivering practical outcomes, not only for the automotive industry but across a number of industry sectors, such as the mining and oil/gas sectors. The broad applicability and practicality of the research will therefore place me in a great position to work with or for a number of leading SA-based companies in these sectors in the future."

The Donald Dyer Scholarship

The Donald Dyer Scholarship was established to encourage postgraduate and other advanced research of an original nature leading to the advancement of knowledge in public relations and communication. The scholarship has been made possible by a generous bequest to the University from the estate of the late Sylvia Dyer. The scholarship recognises the pioneering work of Mrs Dyer's late husband, Donald Dyer, in establishing the Public Relations Institute

of Australia in South Australia.

The Scholarship's inaugural recipient, Dr Collette Snowden, completed her PhD in 2004. She is now Program Director in Communications at UniSA and teaches Public Relations. Her special interests are mobile communications, history of communications and technology, science and technology communication and non-textual communication. As the first Donald Dyer scholar to complete her

PhD, Collette is a role model to the other two scholarship recipients - Leanne Glenny (2005), and Kate Mirandilla (2006).

This much prized scholarship attracts attention both from interstate and overseas. Leanne came from Canberra where she lectured in Communication at Canberra University while Kate lectured in Communication in the Philippines.

Country girl proves nothing is too hard

A country girl from Lock on South Australia's Eyre Peninsula, inaugural recipient of the Don Hawke Memorial scholarship, Kylie Pascoe is no stranger to rural and remote areas.

This year, Kylie's two placements will take her to Darwin and Alice Springs. The Program Director, Roger Windle says of Kylie that nothing fazes her in regard to being given placements away from Adelaide - "In that regard she is a typical practical country lass".

In her final year of the Medical Radiations program, Kylie has completed several practical placements in 2006, including eight weeks at the Daw Park Repatriation Hospital, three weeks at Jones and Partners and three weeks at the Women's and Children's Hospital.

When asked what the future holds, Kylie said "After finishing my degree I will complete a Personal Development

Year (PDY), which is a practical requirement in order to be recognised by the Australian Institute of Radiography. After that, I'd like to work in Africa as a Radiographer and perhaps later return to Australia to study medicine".

The Don Hawke Memorial Scholarship was established by Jean and Tom Pearce, in memory of Jean's brother, the late Don Hawke. This scholarship is unique in that applicants are required to have a 'gap-year' before commencing university.

New Prize for Outstanding Thesis

The Ian Davey Research Prize

"An incredibly generous gift and a fitting legacy" is how Vice Chancellor, Professor Denise Bradley AO, described the new Ian Davey Research Thesis Prize. Emeritus Professor Davey's high commitment to excellence in research has resulted in his funding the establishment of an award for the most outstanding thesis by a Higher Degree Research Student, leading to a Doctor of Philosophy degree.

The award aims to encourage the recipient to travel overseas and undertake further research. The first award of \$2,500 was made at the April 2007 Graduations Ceremony.

When Professor Davey joined UniSA in 1994, it was as

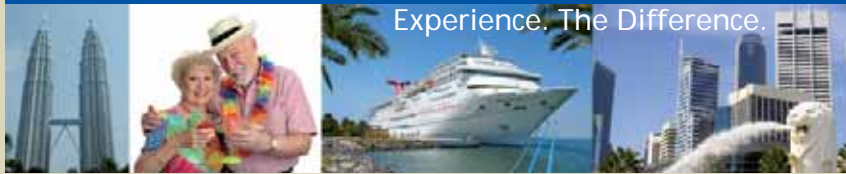
Pro Vice Chancellor, Research, where his contribution has been significant, overseeing the establishment of a number of research institutes and centres. He also led the University's international engagement, nurturing relationships and supporting both research and internationalisation with vigour and finesse. Professor Davey retired as Pro Vice Chancellor and Vice President, Research and Innovation, in 2006.

The winner of the 2007 Ian Davey Research Prize Fund for the most outstanding PhD thesis passed in 2006 is Diwakara Halanaik who graduated in 2006. His thesis: "Institutional Regimes for Sustainable Groundwater Management in India and Australia:

Implications for Water Policy" examines how people self-organise as a necessity rather than an option to manage depleting natural resources. The research also found that social, economic and demographic backgrounds of individuals play a key role in self-organising to manage common pool groundwater resources for irrigation. Thesis examiners commented that Diwakara's was one of the best PhD theses written in 30 years.

Workplace Giving

A little bit goes a long way

UniSA recently implemented a Workplace Giving Program for its employees allowing them to make regular donations to eligible charities through the payroll system as a pre-tax deduction.

By donating \$25 per fortnight, one UniSA employee has estimated that not only has she upgraded her usual annual contribution, but in actual comparable terms it is costing her the same as a cup of coffee per day. After doing the maths she found that her donation, before tax, is actually only costing her just over \$17.00 per fortnight! Her total donation of \$650 for the year will enable the library at UniSA to buy six substantial library books by the end of the year.

Another employee who pays 41.5% tax on her income, has estimated that her before tax contribution of \$50 per fortnight is costing her just over \$29.00 or \$754.00 per annum. She has earmarked her donation for a scholarship at UniSA. Her annual

contribution will actually be \$1,300.00 which is enough to sponsor a UniSA travel scholarship for a financially disadvantaged student.

This is an easy way for UniSA staff to help charitable organisations receive regular funding while at the same time receiving a tax benefit in their fortnightly pay.

Library Collection Appeal

Over the last 15 years, UniSA has emerged to become a vibrant and innovative university, offering the state's widest range of programs to 30,000 students each year. We aim to inspire in our students the self-motivation to read and research so that learning can become a lifelong process.

Fundamental to this is the UniSA Library located at each of our five campuses and providing a total of 20 kilometres of shelving for the 620,000 catalogued items available to students, alumni, commerce, industry and the wider community. These include reference materials on many disciplines ranging from aviation through to zoology.

Each week, there are more than 50,000 visits to the

library while its website welcomes 5 million visitors a year. Added to this, our databases, ebooks and e-journals attract millions more.

As custodians of one of the state's greatest educational resources, we are committed to constantly update, enrich and augment our collection. To help us do this, UniSA launched it's Library Collection Appeal in 2006. Disability Equipment Grant Scheme

UniSA library facilities, which are accessible to students with disabilities also need to be constantly upgraded and enriched. These include our Flexible Information Service (which provides information, assistance and resources to our 6,000 offshore and off-campus students) as well as speech recognition software, screen readers, alternative keyboards and large screen monitors.

With more than 1,500 students with disabilities already enrolled at UniSA and approximately 300 joining us each year, the demand on these resources is considerable. For students who need to study externally or cannot access the on-campus libraries, the disadvantage is even greater. To help these students, UniSA has committed to the establishment of an Equipment Grant Scheme to offer financial assistance which will improve the home-based facilities of students with a disability.
