Instructions to Candidates

- During the exam reading time, students may write their identification details on the cover of their examination booklet and write notes on scrap paper but not in their examination booklet.
- Students may commence writing in their examination booklet at 6.40pm and must stop writing at 8.40pm or when directed to by the exam invigilator, unless they finish earlier.
- All exam submissions to be written in the 16 page university exam booklet provided to each student. If an extra exam book is required, please raise your hand and wait for the exam invigilator to approach you.
- Blank university exam booklets must not be taken from the examination room at the conclusion of the exam.
- Scrap paper will be made available to you by the exam invigilator if required.
- You must clearly write your name, student number, course number, course name and exam question numbers answered on the cover of your exam book.
- Each question that you answer must be clearly numbered according to the part and number in that part. For example, part A, question 2 can be numbered Q. A2. Answers that cannot be identified by the assessor may not be marked.
- Your answers must be written in blue or black ink.
- Sketches or diagrams must be drawn in blue or black ink.
- If you use a direct quote in your essay from a reading in your reader, then this should be referenced. However, references and a reference list to support general discussion are not required.
- Your answers for the questions in Part A of your exam do not need to be referenced.
- There is no word limit for any of the short answer or essay questions.
- The exam must be your own work and no discussion with class mates or any other person is permitted during the exam time.
- No assistance can be provided by University staff except to clarify the exam instructions.
- If a student has a learning disability verified by Learning Connection, then the necessary documentation must be shown to the exam invigilator at the start of the exam, and the special conditions provided (ie amount of extra time, use of special resources).
- An electronic language dictionary may be used in the exam.
- Answer **ALL** questions.
- Each question in Part A is worth 5 marks each. Part A is worth a total of 50 marks. The recommended allocation of time is about 5 minutes/question in Part A or about 55 minutes for the whole of Part A.
- Part B is worth a total of 35 marks. The recommended allocation of time is about 45 minutes for the essay.
- Part C is worth a total of 15 marks. The recommended allocation of time is about 20 minutes for Part C.
- When you have finished your exam, if it is before the official ending time, please leave the examination room as quietly as possible so as not to disturb your classmates who may still be working on their exam.
- The exam is worth 50% of your final course mark.
- A mark of 50% in the exam is required to pass the course.
- When a student has finished the exam, the examination booklet in which the student has entered their answers must be handed to the exam invigilator. Loose notes should not be handed up. The assessment will only take into account answers written in the official 16 page examination booklet provided by the university.
