



## 2008 PROGRAM OVERVIEW

<b>Tuesday 20 May</b>	<p><b>High Quality Research: Building your research capability</b></p> <p>This program day will introduce you to some of the broader issues in research directions, which are determined by specific factors in our external environment. From there, we will interrogate questions about what high impact and high quality research look like. Finally, we will focus on how the University and this Program can assist you in planning your research. There will be a dinner in the evening, for social and networking purposes.</p>
<b>Friday 20 June</b>	<p><b>High Quality Research: Achieving research funding - Mechanisms and strategies</b></p> <p>This is part one of a two-part session on achieving grant funding. This session will focus on where to apply for funding; how to use university systems to best effect in seeking funding; the ethical, legal and human resource aspects of grant-writing; and the determinants of funding success, as identified by a panel of successful researchers.</p>
<b>Friday 25 July</b>	<p><b>High Quality Research: Achieving research funding - Grant writing exercise</b></p> <p>This program day is a very hands-on session, which will provide you with assistance in preparing and/or improving a grant application. In advance of this day, you will need to have a developed research idea, together with an identified funding agency and a draft grant application.</p>
<b>Friday 29 August</b>	<p><b>High Quality Research: Publishing well</b></p> <p>In this program day, you will learn about publishing strategies from successful researchers' perspectives; an editor's view of publications; why publications matter; and publishing your research in its broadest sense – engaging effectively with the media. There will also be a specific focus on developing and evaluating track record.</p>
<b>Friday 26 September</b>	<p><b>High Quality Research: Enhancing personal and social competencies</b></p> <p>The first part of this program day will provide you with individualised analyses of your interpersonal and communication styles, and explore what that means in terms of how you can work most effectively with others. This analysis will then be extended into some relevant topics, such as exploring your own career pathways, managing conflict, and work-life balance.</p>
<b>Friday 24 October</b>	<p><b>High Quality Research: Developing research in collaboration</b></p> <p>The program day will focus on the 'partners' you might be interested to develop your research with at this stage of your career (research clusters, higher degree research students, collaborators), and on the strategies for building research networks (eg. getting the most out of conferences).</p>
<b>Friday 28 November</b>	<p><b>High Quality Research: Calibrating and benchmarking</b></p> <p>Being able to calibrate one's research and one's status as a researcher using appropriate internal and external benchmarks is an important requirement for researchers. Consequently, this program day will focus on this topic comprehensively, and give participants an opportunity to incorporate it into their research plan.</p>
