British context

- 'Forensic', investigative approach
- Some current anxiety about a 'nanny state'
- Heavy reliance on national and local guidelines and procedures – case conferences etc
- No mandatory reporting but strong guidance
- Scottish system more of a 'hybrid' Children's
 Hearing System, whole child approach, 'needs not
 deeds'.

Impetus for change as a result of:

- inquiries into child deaths
- audit and inspections of practice
- shifts in expectations of public services
- increased emphasis on support for parents
- resource constraints
- public concerns about perceived dangers to children
- theoretical discussions about the nature of child abuse.

 - respected and responsible
 - included.



England and Wales

Every Child Matters: Change for Children

- Increasing the focus on supporting families and carers
- Ensuring necessary intervention takes place before children reach crisis point and protect children from falling through the net
- Addressing weak accountability and poor integration
- Ensuring that people working with children are valued, rewarded and trained



Scotland

Getting it Right for Every Child

- Children should get the help they need when they need it
- Agency of first contact must aim to offer help
- Children and parents must not be passed from pillar to post and be screened out of services.
- Reduce bureaucracy




Other agencies referring INTO a protective system

Urban and rural initiatives: health, education, social work


Universal services to respond to the changing needs of children and families:
