As the COVID-19 situation continues to pose uncertainty, I'm writing to let you know that next year we will be continuing with some of our modified teaching and learning arrangements.

**Teaching Arrangements**

To ensure that we can continue to meet social distancing requirements, lectures will continue to be offered online throughout 2022. Your Course Coordinators will continue to make available high-quality learning resources through your learnonline course sites, including full-length lecture recordings, video modules, or other interactive and informative online learning content.

The majority of face-to-face activities will continue to be held on-campus, including seminars, tutorials, and practicals. For each course, your course coordinator will ensure that the specific arrangements are communicated to you.

**Examinations**

For the duration of 2022, the majority of exams will remain online, via the learnonline platform, with the following changes.

- In addition to open book examinations via learnonline, courses may offer online invigilated examinations via learnonline with the remote proctoring service [RPNOW](#).
- All IT system requirements needed to complete an invigilated exam will be detailed in the Course Outline.

The additional hour per examination\* currently offered to students will continue in 2022 and will be incorporated into the published examination time.

Details of examination conditions will be provided by Course Coordinators prior to the examination period.

**Academic Integrity**

I would also like to take this opportunity to remind you of your academic integrity obligations when studying in an online environment. Academic integrity means a commitment to act with honesty, trustworthiness, fairness, respect and responsibility in all academic work, including online examinations. Submitting another student's work as your own, asking others to help you complete an examination response, assisting other students to answer a response, or presenting data that has been copied or falsified all constitute academic misconduct. At UniSA we are able to monitor and detect these types of activities, including the use of software such as Turnitin.

We take breaches of academic integrity very seriously at UniSA. The outcome of a breach may lead to a fail grade in the examination, fail grade in a course, or even suspension for a period of time.
