Dear Colleagues and Students

As you know the federal and state governments have released roadmaps outlining the staged approach to the lifting of restrictions on activities in response to the pandemic. I'm writing to provide you with UniSA's plan for how we will manage teaching and research, our campus facilities and our workplace, over the next period as we look to return to increased on-campus activity.

The plan is available now on the COVID-19 website.

This is a high-level roadmap, and individual workplaces and areas of the University will work within this framework and communicate directly about specific changes. The roadmap will also be adapted if we need to at any time to align with the advice and directions of state and federal governments. While placing the health and safety of staff and students first, we have designed this staged approach also hoping to minimise disruption to the current study plans of students, and to allow time for preparation of workplaces and facilities.

I would ask you to note the following key points in the roadmap:

- Lectures will remain online for the remainder of 2020
- Tutorials, practicals, seminars and workshops will be delivered on-campus from 15 June where social distancing guidelines can be implemented
- University facilities eg food outlets will open progressively from 18 May, but in line with state government protocols (ie takeaway and limited sit-down dining)
- Staff will begin to transition back to the workplace from 15 June but in a staged manner and in consultation with their managers who will determine the best arrangement for delivery of their services
- There will be regular enhanced cleaning practices on campus.

I want to again thank everyone for your collegiality, patience and commitment during this extraordinary period.

Like the rest of our community we cannot be complacent as we look to the resumption of some activities, but we do look forward to taking these first steps in recreating the campus environment we value so much.
