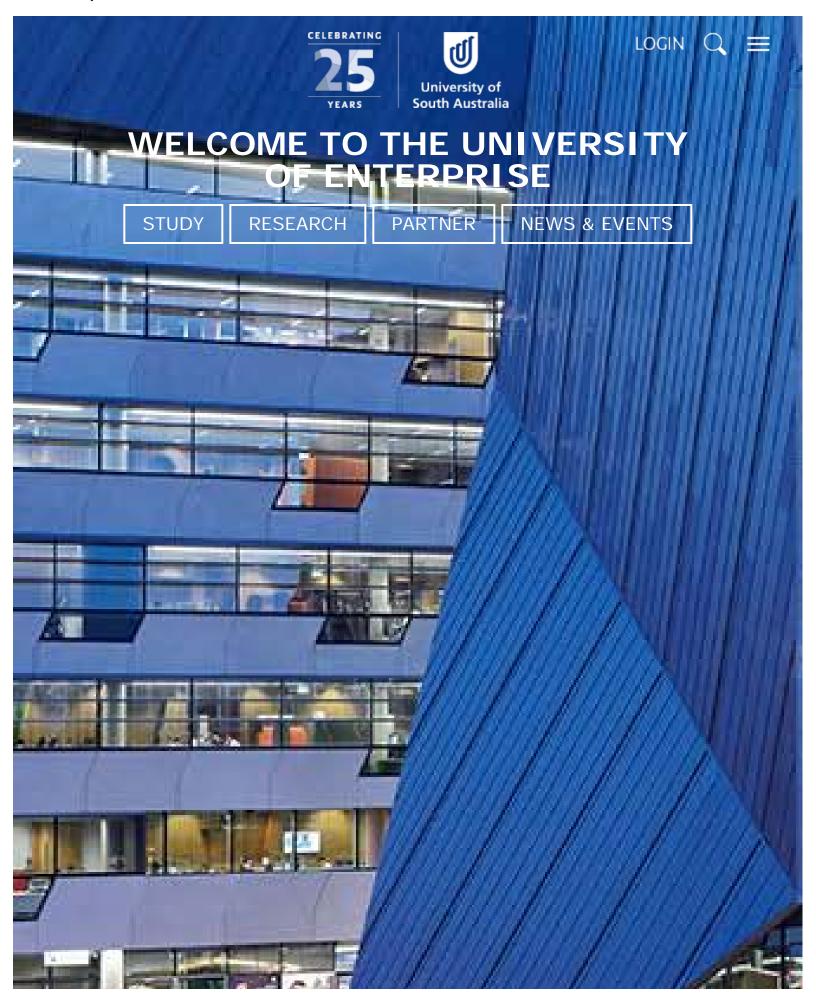



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
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O-Week festival in overdrive

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Students energise George Street with splash of colour

Visitors to City West campus might have noticed an unexpected splash of colour after George Street was made into a work of art by UniSA students.

The special project, which started in January, was part of the Adelaide City Council's Splash Adelaide initiative, and transformed George Street from asphalt grey to a place awash with colour and sharp shapes.

Recent Visual Communication graduate Ngoc Yen Nguyen was one of six Art, Architecture and Design students selected from the 68 who expressed interest in being involved in the project.

Ngoc Yen says she wanted to be part of something that would add colour to the campus.

"It was a really fun project to work on because I got to work with a group of people who are interested in doing the same thing as me," she says.

Ngoc Yen Nguyen on George Street "The process involved individual sketches of the painted street which were then developed and refined at a one-day workshop. We came up with three final variations that went to a panel of judges for the final decision.



"It took about two weeks on and off to create. We used masking tape and rolls of paper to mark out the design. The boundaries were taped first and colour laid down in stages.

"The experience has given me more of an insight into how projects on such a large scale work and how much organisation goes into planning it and coordinating the people and materials.

"It's been getting a really great reception from people passing by, and lots of interaction with younger kids. The colours act to energise people in the surrounding areas."

Final year Graphic Design student Luke Moore says he enjoyed collaborating on such a large-scale project.

"I enjoyed working on the project, it was a really good process. It was pretty hot while we were working, but we got through it," Luke says.

"I usually work pretty geometrically but it's given me a way to think about scale, and how things work on a big scale, so it makes me think about my processes.

"It's also great for my portfolio and it's really good to have this big space."

UniSA lecturer Toby Richardson, who came up with the concept of transforming George Street, says he was inspired by Swiss artists Sabina Lang and Daniel Baumann who have brightened streets across Europe and beyond with their bold use of colour.

"When I was doing some research, I saw what Sabina Lang and Daniel Baumann were doing with similar spaces, and I thought that would be a great way of working with what I thought was a dead space, George Street," Richardson says.

"With the support of Professor Mads Gaardboe, Head of the School of Art, Architecture and Design, we received a grant from UniSA's Facilities Management Unit, and six months later it's done, with the help of Adelaide City Council's Splash Adelaide initiative.

"I'm proud of what the students have done. Already, having other students on campus and people walking past, the feedback has been fantastic.

"The students learned to work to a tight deadline, collaboratively, and to a pretty strict brief, as well as learning how to physically do this and how to conceptually develop the idea.

"Rarely do you get the opportunity to do something on this sort of scale, so the students are all chuffed to be part of that creative team."

The George Street art project was unveiled at a launch on February 12.

UniSA Vice Chancellor Professor David Lloyd says the project represents just one aspect of the kind of scheme that builds vibrant communities.

"This is a temporary artwork in the lead up to the more permanent changes that will happen to George Street and the wider Hindley Street precinct through major greening and redesign plans, but in one way that helps to give the work more edge," he says.

"It has been a great project for students because it gave them a range of issues to consider – the power and influence of art in the environment, the interplay between art, architecture and design, the impermanence of art and ideas around the value of art and its power to transform environments."

From the Vice Chancellor





The new academic year has only just begun and we're already off to a flying start. In keeping true to the spirit and the word of *Crossing the Horizon* we have, in the space of just a few days, announced some major new partnerships in innovation that will ensure UniSA is at the forefront of creativity and new knowledge that will inform our research and our teaching into the future.

While we welcome and focus our attention this month on the almost 7000 new faces who will join us on campus, just think for a moment of the impact this university will have on all students' lives over the next few years.

Those with a talent for ICT will receive a huge career boost from the partnership that we have begun with IT giant Hewlett-Packard. Together we are setting up an Innovation and Collaboration Centre – the first of its kind in Australia - to support education and excellence in the science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) subjects that this nation, and this State, so urgently need.

As part of the new partnership, UniSA and HP will co-develop and launch a new four-year honours degree program in IT and business informatics, coupling leading edge training and education with internships at HP for students during the course of their studies. The Centre will have its permanent home in the University's new science building being constructed as part of the health precinct developments and partner with us in the foundation of **Sci I C I Ed** when that is built. The science building will also house another vital partnership,

that which we have with SA Pathology. The Centre for Cancer Biology just last week was given a \$6.67 million grant from the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) to lead vital research into leukaemia.

While we are transforming the way students current and future will experience this university, two new product design and innovation centres are also in the process of being set up with Hills Limited.

Now I may have underestimated the importance of the Hills Hoist. I thought of it as an outdoor clothes dryer. Instead I have learned that it is fundamental to Australia's sporting prowess in aerial gymnastics, swimming and cricket, as millions of Australian kids spent long summer afternoons hanging off the Hills Hoist suspended over lawn sprinklers or batting at cricket balls that were tied to the lines. So I know Hills is an Australian icon and together we're going to do some original thinking in product design and innovation which we hope will become as important to this nation as was the Hills Hoist. The two new centres will be showcases for smart collaboration in the State, engaging students, independent designers and innovators, researchers and businesses, to collaborate on projects, incubate new ideas and products, and commercialise new designs.

And just in case you think we were slacking off towards the end of this month, dreaming of long summer days hanging over lawn sprinklers, we have also welcomed a new institute to UniSA. The Institute for Choice, which we launched in Sydney and in Adelaide recently, brings together the highest concentration of academic expertise in choice behaviour research globally. It is based in Sydney and offers businesses access to leading academic and applied research relevant to consumer choice and consumer behaviours.

So that was just February. We're heading into a State election in March which will bring about even more new initiatives no matter what the result, and we'll also be making announcements about internationalisation and offshore campuses.

Did I mention that we were in danger of becoming the go-to university for problem solving? Hang onto your Hills Hoist. It's going to go even faster as we move into the year.

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New program looks at new frontier in psychology

A group of 50 – 60 students is expected to begin South Australia's only program that specialises in cognitive neuroscience as they embark on UniSA's new Bachelor of Psychological Science (Cognitive Neuroscience) this month.

Program Director Dr Mark Kohler says employers will be increasingly seeking graduates from psychology with a thorough understanding of the brain basis of thought and behaviour.

"With advances in technology and knowledge, brain basis of human thought and behaviour is the new frontier in psychology," Dr Kohler says.

"It is exciting that UniSA can offer a new program with this emphasis and it's the only such program currently available in South Australia.

"For students who are particularly interested in psychological research, many of the greatest gains in the future will be had in the cognitive neurosciences.

"The program equips students with excellent research skills, technical knowledge, and a background in the biological basis of human thought and behaviour.

"This makes graduates particularly suited to positions such as clinical technologists, research assistants in private, academic and clinical facilities, psychological assistants, and positions in companies that service conditions and disabilities that impact human psychology but that have a known or presumed biological basis. The program is also an excellent basis from which to pursue further postgraduate studies."

To accompany the program, a new Cognitive Neuroscience Laboratory is currently being built on the Magill campus on the ground floor of the Amy Wheaton building.

Dr Kohler says an exciting part of the new program is the construction of the laboratory.

"Over the course of their degree, students will spend time in the lab learning brain imaging techniques and practicing experimental research skills," he says.

"The laboratory is a facility dedicated to the program and houses equipment such as electroencephalography (recording electrical activity of the brain), and transcranial Doppler (measuring blood flow through major arteries of the brain).

"A core emphasis of the new program is to provide practical experience and skills.

"With plans for expanding facilities in the future, I think the Bachelor of Psychological Science (Cognitive Neuroscience) is one of the most exciting developments in undergraduate teaching at present."

While the Bachelor of Psychological Science (Cognitive Neuroscience) is UniSA's only new undergraduate program for 2014, there are a number of new postgraduate programs.


In the field of engineering, there are six new programs: Master of Engineering (Civil and Environmental), Master of Engineering (Civil and Transport), Master of Engineering (Electrical Power), Master of Engineering (Telecommunications), and the Graduate Diploma in Engineering (Autonomous Systems) which can then lead to the Master of Engineering (Autonomous Systems).

In the area of data science, there are a suite of three new programs that are addressing the need for more data experts – a Graduate Certificate in Data Science and a Graduate Diploma in Data Science that can be followed by a Master of Data Science.

"Being able to analyse economic and social trends by examining a number of disparate and large datasets has applications in some vital areas including health, security, social service delivery and infrastructure planning," says Head of UniSA's School of Information Technology and Mathematical Sciences, Professor Andy Koronios.

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\$6 million grant for CCB to lead fight against leukaemia

The Centre for Cancer Biology - an alliance between UniSA and SA Pathology - has secured a \$6.67 million grant from the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) this month to lead vital new research into leukaemia.

Led by Professor Angel Lopez, the research is designed to track down the mechanisms that control blood cell formation and how cell abnormalities play a part in the progression of the disease, and its return post remission.

Securing the prestigious NHMRC Program grant for the next five years – one of only 11 awarded nationally – Prof Lopez and a team of scientists will work not only on finding how blood cell abnormalities influence the progress of leukaemia, but also on the development and application of new life-saving therapies.

Prof Lopez says the size and duration of the grant makes a big difference to what scientists can achieve.

"To have support for this research collaboration for the next five years is really vital because it provides stability that allows us to take risks and think outside the square, while giving us time to translate our fundamental research right through to better clinical practices," Prof Lopez says.

"This research is part of the vanguard work in cancer treatment which seeks to identify how to better target the cancer to prevent disease progression – so we work to understand what is particularly going wrong in the cancer cells."

UniSA Vice Chancellor Professor David Lloyd says he is delighted with news of the \$6 million-plus grant for the CCB. He says the CCB has grown to become a flagship research centre that is highly regarded internationally.

"This grant will further expand the CCB's world-class research into blood and other cancers," Prof Lloyd says.

Honorary Doctorate in India for Ravi Naidu

A leading agricultural university in India awarded UniSA's Professor Ravi Naidu with an Honorary Doctorate at the end of last year.

Tamil Nadu Agricultural University (TNAU) is a leading agro-technology education provider in India and its graduates are recognised throughout the world.



Prof Naidu, CEO of the Cooperative Research Centre for Contamination Assessment and Remediation of the Environment and Founding Director of the Centre for Environmental Risk Assessment and Remediation at

UniSA, was bestowed the honorary degree of Doctor of Science for his outstanding contributions in agriculture and allied areas.

While Prof Naidu has a long association with TNAU, it is very rare for the university to award such a degree to people who are not from TNAU.

"It is an association that makes me very proud," Prof Naidu says. "I worked with many other dedicated professionals to establish the university's environmental science facilities, which are now truly world class.

"I am happy to say that my relationship with TNAU has also yielded some excellent research outcomes. These include solving the problem of tannery waste contamination – work that also allowed us to convince regulatory authorities of the need for a tough policy on tannery waste disposal – and strategies to manage and remediate large areas of contaminated agricultural soils."

In accepting the Honorary Doctorate Prof Naidu also thanked the Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research whose support founded the collaboration between the two UniSA centres and TNAU.

Water grabbing paper earns social impact award

Two UniSA researchers from the Centre for Accounting, Governance and Sustainability have been awarded the 2013 Social Impact Award by global publisher Emerald.

Research Associate Dr Joanne Tingey-Holyoak (pictured right) and Senior Research Fellow Dr John Pisaniello were honoured with the award for their paper titled *Implications of biomass production and accountability for "water grabbing"* which was published in the *Sustainability Accounting, Management and Policy Journal.*

Emerald launched the Social Impact Award in 2010 to recognise a paper that made a big impact on society from one of its 290 journals.

Dr Tingey-Holyoak says the award was a surprise but very meaningful.

"It was meaningful to receive the award as the journal was unranked in terms of ERA but it is read widely by sustainability accounting practitioners and policymakers," Dr Tingey-Holyoak says.

"We always strive to undertake and communicate research which has real-world applications and which influences public thinking and policy-making and, along these lines, this paper arose from a desire to investigate the implications of increases in demand for biomass production on water storage behaviours.

"Our prior work in climates of high variability in rainfall, where there is pressures on farmers to build up onfarm surface water supplies to the detriment of communities and businesses, led to a need to explore the added water storage pressures that will arise from future demands for biomass.

"We did find that this rising demand in biomass production could place communities at increased threat from drought and flood and recommended the rapid development of appropriate policy, and so the recognition of the social impact of the paper from the prestigious experts from the Globally Responsible Leadership Initiative is extremely valued."

The Globally Responsible Leadership Initiative is the largest community of businesses and business schools/learning institutions that are uniquely focused on developing a new generation of globally responsible leaders.

Success worth all the mess

A UniSA Honours student and Bachelor of Visual Arts graduate with a passion for working with clay to create captivating pieces of work is one of only five Australian artists to be awarded a ceramic scholarship.

Ebony Heidenreich (pictured above), was awarded the one-year Trudie Alfred Bequest Ceramic Scholarship earlier this month which will help her undertake her Honours program in 2014.

"Receiving the scholarship is not only a huge encouragement to me as an emerging artist but it made it financially possible for me to undertake more study, in turn creating that precious, focused time to experiment and develop in my craft," Ebony says.

For Ebony, a year off from studying in 2013 gave the artist a chance to rejuvenate her creative juices while keeping busy teaching basic clay, painting, cooking and dance to children, working on her wheel-throwing skills and helping other students in the UniSA ceramic department.

She was also selected to take part in the 2013 Helpmann Graduate Exhibition and says she was honoured to

have her work in a vase show called Bloom alongside some of her all-time ceramic heroes.

"I love the tactile element of working with clay, the ability to make something useful or simply beautiful with my own hands and basic tools; to craft something rather than purchase it and to labour and take pride in a finished product which will ultimately inspire, captivate or move another person," Ebony says.

"I do a lot of casting in porcelain which I find exciting but I also love the organic sense of movement achieved on the wheel. Sometimes I just love to hate it, but that's all part of the challenge which makes every success worth all the mess."

Ebony creates a variety of work with clay, from large-scale colourful towers like her pictured 'Stay Connected' work to delicate porcelain castings of hands and gloves inspired by her interest in women within the home.

Ebony says the outcome of her work is always different, but she would describe the process of making as an ever-developing series of trials and errors, rigorous testing, happy accidents, giving up and starting again.

"It's an endless exploration of ideas and materials; discovering what works and what inexplicably flops or explodes, cracks or warps in the kiln," she says.

"It's an anxious, exciting, unknown, sometimes heartbreaking and yet extremely addictive process; the desired outcome being a resolved body of work which is both conceptually driven and professionally executed."

The Trudie Alfred Bequest Ceramic Scholarship is awarded annually by the Australian Ceramics Association.

Trudie Alfred (1922 – 2010) was a well-known Sydney potter and teacher with a great passion for ceramics. She struggled financially to sustain a ceramic practice in her early years as a potter and so, to assist others in a similar position, she left a generous bequest to the Australian Ceramics Association. Trudie specified that the funds be used to support the work of students preparing to embark on a career in the field of ceramics.

Local clip captures global attention

A locally made video clip explaining the 'hubble and bubble' of chemistry has joined the likes of NASA and National Geographic science clips after it was selected as the clip of the week for the prestigious international website Science Photo Library.

The clip is an extract from online resources designed to strengthen students' knowledge of science, technology, engineering and maths subjects and to improve their transition to university study. The animation is one of many developed as part of a UniSA and Adelaide High School project, funded by the federal government's Higher Education Participation and Partnerships Program (HEPPP).

Local Adelaide High School teacher Rhys Lewis and now ex-student Minh Tan Pham were the brains behind the clip, which captures the reaction between copper metal and concentrated nitric acid.

Driven by a passion to improve student learning, Lewis has been working on developing science clips for the past year. The high school teacher says he jumped at the chance to be part of the HEPPP learning resources development project when the opportunity arose towards the end of last year.

"As a teacher of science I am in a position of teaching a practical subject which is filled with exciting experiments which are visually stunning," Lewis says.

"Many of the concepts taught at a high school level are quite challenging and I knew that I could improve anyone's understanding by providing all students with a series of recorded presentations which were simple to understand without detracting from the necessary content.

"Together with Minh Tan Pham, a Year 12 student of mine from the class of 2013, we shot 50 videos and

uploaded many of them to the Science Photo Library. Their feedback and support was overwhelming.

"Within three days we had more than 10 clips being exhibited on their website and by the end of the first week, we had been notified that one of our clips had received their biggest honour which is known as 'clip of the week'.

"To give you an idea of the prestige of this award, the previous week's winner was NASA. For us to win it in the first five days of screening on the site was incredible and both Minh Tan and myself were speechless."

The 10 clips, including the clip of the week, have already received more than 50,000 views on the Science Photo Library.

Lewis says the clips are also proving to be a success in the classroom.

"The results my five senior classes in 2013 achieved improved significantly from the previous year with more than 50 per cent of my Year 12 students achieving an A grade in the subjects of physics and chemistry," he says.

Biology, chemistry, physics and mathematics online resources developed within the HEPPP project will be accessible on the UniSA Moodle for Year 11 and 12 students across the state, as well as UniSA students. The goal is to improve students' understanding of key concepts in science, maths, engineering and technology by having resources which use engaging ways of illustrating concepts.

The sights and sounds of one of the state's largest music and cultural festivals will turn Adelaide's Botanic Park into a four-day-long festival playground when WOMADelaide comes to town in March.

Behind the scenes, UniSA student Sophie Murray has been hard at work in the WOMADelaide communications headquarters, completing an internship as part of her Public Relations degree.

Set to complete her degree mid-year, Sophie says the chance to work at the internationally renowned festival was a dream come true.

"I have always wanted to work in the arts and music industry and WOMADelaide is one of my favourite festivals so it was just a perfect opportunity," Sophie says.

"The people here are great and I've been thrown in the deep end from the start, which is the best way to learn.

"I've been researching new media opportunities, as well as media monitoring. I have also started contacting media outlets and pitching interview opportunities for local artists as well as organising interviews for international artists."

Sophie hopes her experience at WOMADelaide will help her secure another position in the arts industry after

she graduates.

"In the long run, I would like to do postgraduate studies in publishing or something along those lines but straight after graduating, I'm hoping to get my hands on another festival," she says.

Sophie isn't the first intern who cut her teeth at WOMADelaide. UniSA Graduate Diploma in Public Relations graduate Leigh McGrane started his own career in publicity management at the same festival in 2007.

Leigh has gone on to manage the public relations of a number of festivals both at home and abroad and this year returns to WOMADelaide for his third stint as publicity manager for the event.

"The internship at WOMADelaide was the first of many I undertook during my studies," Leigh says.

"The most rewarding aspect of the initial internship was that it allowed me to make practical use of my studies, as I was not only learning the "technical/classroom" methods of working within the public relations sector, but simultaneously putting what I was learning into practical use.

"I have now worked on many festivals, started my own arts/entertainment PR business and travelled throughout the UK and Europe working.

"The major highlights would be working as a press manager at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival in Scotland – the biggest of its kind in the world – and seeing Australia, Europe and the UK from the back of a tour bus with numerous bands and musicians."

This year, for the first time, UniSA is also involved in WOMADelaide on a larger scale, partnering with the festival to host its sustainability talks program – the *Planet Talks*. The *Planet Talks* program returns to the festival's Speakers Corner area for a second year with a line-up of inspiring speakers from around the globe.

Hosted by the ABC's Robyn Williams and Bernie Hobbs, the 2014 program includes UK barrister, award-winning author and Ecocide campaign founder, Polly Higgins; Peter Garrett; journalist Annabel Crabb, and more.

O-Week starts voyage to a playground journey and new career

A conversation with a fellow student while paddling down Adelaide's Onkaparinga River in a canoe during O-Week has set UniSA student Tara Forbes' life on different course that involves playgrounds and fundraising.

The Bachelor of Environmental Science student began her studies with a vague idea that she liked maps and geography, but 10 months after that canoe conversation about travelling abroad, Tara found herself on a plane to Fiji with that same student, on a journey to pursue a career in sustainable development.

Tara (pictured right) volunteered for two weeks in the coastal village of Namatakula, restoring the village school – Ratu Filise Memorial School – as part of her Global Experience program at UniSA. It was in this village that another conversation took place with a local kindergarten teacher which would also have an unexpected impact on Tara.

"I stayed back one night to help paint the school and the kindergarten teacher came in. She said that while she



was really grateful for what we had done, she had hoped we would bring playground equipment for kids to play on, like Australian kids have," Tara says.

"I didn't realise it at the time, but it was one of those conversations that just stays with you. Back home, when I dropped my own boys off at school a week later, I saw all these kids just playing on the school playground and realised it was something we take for granted – in Australia there are playgrounds everywhere.

"I thought to myself 'I think I want to build a playground in Fiji'."

With the support of the UniSA Global Experience program, Tara spent the next year fundraising to bring a playground to the small village, returning to the Pacific nation almost exactly a year later with a playground and suitcases full of school equipment and toys in tow.

"Fijians have such a sense of family so for someone to return to the village is already a big deal but to rock up with all these boxes of equipment ... the kids in the village were so excited," she says.

"Kindergarten is optional and money is quite tight so people in Fiji often don't send their kids to kindergarten.

"But the school adopted a rule that only village children that enrolled in school can play on the playground so it was really an incentive for people to think about education. Through the playground, people in the village saw the benefits of paying the money.

"According to the school, registrations for kids to go to kindergarten have increased by 50 per cent for intakes. They now need to get another teacher on board."

Tara, who will graduate this year, is now in the process of setting up her own charity – tentatively called Pirate Playgrounds – which will provide playground equipment to other village schools in Fiji, working in collaboration with Community Support Network, a Fijian charity which works alongside rural communities to achieve sustainable development through a number of projects.

In addition, Tara is set to start her Honours degree this year, examining what drives people to donate to micro-financing websites under the supervision of Dr Barbara Koth at the School of Natural and Built Environments.

Tara hopes her varied international experience during her degree, which also included a Global Experience study tour of Vietnam, will stand her in good stead to ultimately secure a role at the World Bank. While it is not the job she set out to get at the start of her degree, she says she has now found her passion.

"This is not the direction I thought I would take, not at all," she says. "But I tried to take advantage of the opportunities that were given to me at university. I immersed myself in it.

"You've really got to put all your fear to the side and just jump in and find the programs that are available to you, like Global Experience."

UniSA's Global Experience program offers a range of local and overseas experiences for students from all programs to give their degree a global edge. In 2013, 46 students graduated from Global Experience, the largest cohort since the program's inception in 2008.

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

New partnerships focus on IT and innovation

UniSA has forged two key partnerships with industry this month which will benefit not only UniSA students and researchers but also industry and innovation in South Australia.

The first partnership is with global IT giant Hewlett-Packard (HP) while the second is with South Australian company Hills Limited.

Under the HP partnership, UniSA will be home to a new HP Innovation and Collaboration Centre.

HP is set to begin operations in April at the City West campus before moving into the University's new health and biomedical building on North Terrace in 2018.

As part of the partnership, UniSA and HP will jointly develop and, next year, launch a new four-year honours degree program in IT and business informatics, coupling leading edge training and education with internships at HP for students during the course of their studies.

A \$5.5 million state government grant will help UniSA establish the HP Innovation and Collaboration Centre. The State Government will also commit \$150,000 a year for a student entrepreneur initiative that will support innovative students to pursue commercialisation of new ideas in the ICT sector in partnership with HP and other companies.

HP will also be a foundation partner in UniSA's Science I Creativity I Education Studio (SciCEd) which will also be located in the new building.

UniSA Vice Chancellor Professor David Lloyd says the partnership will support education, participation and achievement in science, information and communications technologies, engineering and maths – all key in underpinning the next generation of entrepreneurs who can succeed on a global scale.

"HP's expansion and investment in South Australia will bring jobs growth but also vital opportunities for students and graduates to engage in industry-based experience and learning," Prof Lloyd says.

"The new HP Innovation and Collaboration Centre at UniSA will provide a unique environment where students, graduates, commercialisation experts and industry have opportunities to explore new ideas for business and products, acting as an incubator for new small to medium enterprises (SMEs) and a pipeline for the commercialisation of new innovations."

Times Higher Education already ranks UniSA's IT programs in the world's top 100, and sixth in Australia.

Managing Director, HP South Pacific, Nick Wilson says HP is excited to be partnering with UniSA and the South Australian Government to help develop further and promote ICT education, training and careers in the state.

"Our collaboration with UniSA in developing a four-year honours degree will give South Australian students access to world-leading ICT education," Wilson says.

"SMEs, industry and students will also be able to take advantage of the extraordinary new Innovation and Collaboration Centre.

"In addition, HP will increase its workforce in the state by some 400 people over the next four years.

"We are committed to South Australia and to this exciting new ICT partnership."

The ICT industry currently contributes more than \$100 billion to the national economy and it's estimated that it will generate around \$1 trillion in revenue for Australia in 2050.

UniSA partners in national design and innovation centres

UniSA will be a key player in a new partnership with Hills Limited to put South Australia at the forefront of innovative product design and technology expertise for a wide range of industries, from aged care and health to security and safety.

The partnership, together with Flinders University, will see the development of two new innovation centres in South Australia underpinned by a \$5 million cocontribution from Hills Limited and the State Government.



The two new centres – the Lance Hill Design Centre (named after the inventor of the Hills Hoist) and the Digital Research and Commercialisation Centre – will be showcases for smart collaboration in the state, engaging students, independent designers and innovators, researchers and businesses, to collaborate on projects, incubate new ideas and products, and commercialise new designs.

UniSA Vice Chancellor, Professor David Lloyd, says the project is an example of how clever cities deliver innovation, increase their connectivity, and build capacity for the future.

"This project is an exemplar of how we need to approach business development in the state into the future," Prof Lloyd says.

"The hallmarks of successful enterprises are that they develop strategic collaborations; harness talents across the spectrum from the theoretical to the practical; have a guiding notion of the problems that need to be solved, and a practical way to make good ideas a reality. This partnership ticks all those boxes.

"This partnership continues our long association with Hills, a South Australian company that has nurtured the careers of many of our graduates in design and engineering. It fosters important collaboration with Flinders University so that we can each bring our research strengths to the table."

Hills Limited's Group Managing Director and CEO, Ted Pretty, says the company is undergoing a major

transformation to meet the challenges of the global marketplace.

"We are delighted with the support we have had from the State Government and the enthusiasm showed by the universities in working with us," Mr Pretty says.

He says it is expected that five new permanent roles will be created immediately with the potential of material increases of up to 50 people as the new centres mature.

"We hope the centres will also stimulate and indirectly support up to 30 additional local researchers and developers. We also plan to reinvest 50 per cent of after-tax profits earned in the first three years on any IP developed in the centres up to the \$2.5m committed by government," Mr Pretty says.

You could say the University of South Australia is so excited to welcome the new members of its Institute for Choice that they launched it twice.

This month the new Institute dedicated to researching decision-making and choice behavior was launched in North Sydney at its new home base in Arthur Street and then again in Adelaide. The Sydney event introduced corporate and research partners to the new face of the Institute for Choice and Adelaide the launch introduced the broader UniSA research community to new colleagues.

Bringing together the highest concentration of academic expertise in choice behaviour research globally, the new Institute for Choice has academic staff and affiliates from around Australia and the world.

Speaking at the launch UniSA Vice Chancellor Professor David Lloyd said the group is a veritable United Nations assembly of world experts in the behavioural and social sciences.

"This new venture, which provides UniSA's Institute for Choice its own Sydney shop front, represents the modern collaborative research face of UniSA," Prof Lloyd says.

"When it comes to research we are increasingly solutions-focused and to take that approach we can't afford to be bound by geography.

"The new Institute is based in Sydney because it is a key centre in the Asia-Pacific and is already a strong focus for business in the region. What the Institute can offer those businesses is access to leading academic and applied research relevant to consumer choice and consumer behaviours.

"It will offer them a multidisciplinary view of how decision making occurs and underpins analysis, for example, of new product developments or the provision of social services."

While researchers from the new Institute for Choice are no strangers to UniSA's own Ehrenberg Bass Institute for Marketing Science, having collaborated on projects in the past, the formation of the new Institute will also encourage stronger and more strategic research collaboration on projects of global reach with other related research teams at UniSA to deliver unique understandings of markets, buyer and consumer choice behaviour.

In addition, the team will continue its longstanding academic and applied focus on choice behaviours related to social, environmental, health and other societally relevant issues.

Founder of the Institute and Research Professor Jordan Louviere says choice modelling is a sophisticated and complex business science.

"It is a powerful tool for understanding and analysing why people behave the way they do," he says.

At the launch he announced the Institute's newest project working with the World Bank to examine youth employment.

The research will employ a survey instrument that identifies the constraints facing younger people in their respective labour markets around the world.

Prof Louviere says the move to join UniSA and establish the Institute for Choice had been one of the most positive experiences he has had in his university career and one which will underpin continued growth in the powerful field of choice behavior and decision making.

The Institute for Choice will be part of the UniSA Business School. It brings together experts in psychology, statistics, economics marketing, organizational behavior and management.

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

The science and security of silver

When UniSA environmental researcher Dr Erica Donner (pictured below), was undertaking her Honours field work on the floodplains of Australia's northern rivers more than 10 years ago, she certainly didn't imagine where her research career would one day take her.

An interest in environmental risk assessment and the rapidly increasing use of silver nanotechnology in consumer products sparked her curiosity about the possible spread of silver-resistant bacteria and their impacts on society. This has inspired her recent move to lead a team of researchers from across a range of disciplines to investigate the science behind this potential risk-management issue.

"Silver is used in healthcare to prevent and control infection, particularly for burns patients, but also in many other medical applications, so the spread of silver-resistant bacteria could be a serious issue," Dr Donner says.

Thanks to a successful Australian Research Council (ARC) Future Fellowship grant, Dr Donner will spend the next four years researching the environmental occurrence of bacterial silver resistance and cross-resistance and its implications for medical science and the commercial applications of silver nanotechnology.

"It's a topic that gives me the chance to learn a lot of new techniques and use them all together to try to assess and manage a risk that could have serious social



consequences if not addressed," Dr Donner says.

"Antimicrobial agents, such as the antibiotics doctors prescribe to treat bacterial infections, have worked wonders in modern medicine and people in developed countries like Australia have been lulled into a sense of security about the ability to fight bacterial infection.

"This sense of security probably isn't justified anymore. In recent years we've started to hear a lot more about 'hospital superbugs' and multiple resistant bacterial pathogens.

"It can sound a bit like media hype but if you look at the data, the spread of antimicrobial resistance does pose a major threat to medicine and health. Resistant pathogens complicate and increase the cost of treatment, prolong illness, and increase the risk of death.

"In fact, the World Health Organisation has identified antimicrobial resistance as a global health security emergency. They warn that antimicrobial resistance threatens a return to the pre-antibiotic era, something that is probably almost inconceivable to many Australians.

"If we can't control infections, the success of other medical advances will also be jeopardised. For example, organ transplants and operations, especially in very ill or immunocompromised patients, become increasing dangerous and are less likely to succeed.

"Research shows that biocidal agents like silver can help boost our antimicrobial arsenal, which is increasingly being overcome by the rapid spread of resistant pathogens. We need to make sure that we don't undermine its effectiveness by using it unwisely."

Dr Donner will be studying silver chemistry and bacterial communities in a range of environments such as hospitals, industrial settings, wastewater and soil to find out more about the current presence of silver-resistance in bacteria, and how that resistance is carried genetically. The aim is to discover what kind of situations may induce the further spread of such resistances and whether society needs to do something differently to manage and control that.



"As a scientist the idea of genetic resistance is in itself really interesting, even without the added significance for human health," Dr Donner says. "The ease with which micro-organisms can transfer and spread resistance depends on the way it is encoded in their DNA but in some cases it can happen extremely rapidly and across species.

"This project will make use of the recent massive advances in high-throughput DNA sequencing technologies which make it possible to do really interesting and in-depth research that we simply couldn't do just a few years ago."

Dr Donner received her ARC Future Fellowship for this project at the end of last year. She will be joined in Adelaide by Research Associate Dr Sotirios Vasileiadis who is joining UniSA from Italy in March to work on this project. Dr Vasileiadis specialises in microbial metagenomics and bioinformatics. The two researchers started collaborating on preliminary experiments on silver resistance a couple of years ago.

"Together we have a nice range of complementary skills to tackle this research and we have a great team of collaborators both within UniSA and further afield who are also interested in pursuing this research question," Dr Donner says.

"To have significant funding and the green light to concentrate specifically on this research is really exciting for me.

"It's a research topic that I'm really fascinated by and it's particularly exciting to have the opportunity to learn a lot of new techniques and to work with and learn from a lot of different researchers."
